Red Cross Declares First-ever Blood Crisis amid Omicron Surge

The American Red Cross is facing a national blood crisis – its worst blood shortage in over a decade, posing a concerning risk to patient care. Amid this crisis, doctors have been forced to make difficult decisions about who receives blood transfusions and who will need to wait until more products become available. Blood and platelet donations are critically needed to help prevent further delays in vital medical treatments.

The Red Cross asks the country to roll up a sleeve to help ensure people receive the care they need. Make an appointment to give blood or platelets as soon as possible by using the Red Cross Blood Donor App, visiting [RedCrossBlood.org](https://www.redcrossblood.org) or calling 1-800-RED CROSS (1-800-733-2767)

The Red Cross has experienced a 10% decline in the number of people donating blood since the beginning of the pandemic and continues to confront relentless issues due to the pandemic, including ongoing blood drive cancellations and staffing limitations. Adding to the concern is the surge of COVID-19 cases. The Red Cross has experienced low donor turnout ever since the delta variant began spreading in August, and that trend continues as the Omicron variant takes over.

All types are needed now, especially types O positive and O negative, as well as platelet donations, to help reverse this national blood crisis.

REMEMBERING ONE OF OUR OWN

Patrick J Carnell Cottage Street, Torresdale

DOB: 9/20/1945

KIA: 10/25/1967

“Pat is a quiet but friendly fellow” read the caption next to Carnell’s senior picture in the 1963 Abraham Lincoln High School yearbook. “We know he’ll be a success in college whatever he attempts.” The 22 year old Specialist Four had worked for United Parcel Service by day and attended Temple University at night before being drafted into the Army in November 1966. He was a gunner and team leader, and was assigned to Company D of the 4th Battalion, 9th Infantry, 25th Infantry Division in Vietnam. Carnell died on October 25, 1967, in Cu Chi, Bin Duong Province. He was survived by his mother. ¹



Patrick is buried in Forest Hill Cemetery and is memorialized on the Vietnam Veterans Wall on Panel 28E Line 64. ²

Dear Pat, On Memorial Day 2020 I wanted to let you know that you are not forgotten. My mother, Eunice Snook nee Knapp, was your Sunday School teacher at the Rhawnhurst Baptist Church in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania when you were a ten year old boy. She was recalled taking you and your classmates on field trips in Philadelphia and said, "Everyone knew and loved Pat. He was always a leader." My mother left Philadelphia after college and described receiving a letter in 1967 telling her of your death in combat. As she is almost 85 years old my mother tells me of people she looks forward to meeting in heaven and includes you in that group. As an Army veteran it is my privilege to salute you Specialist Carnell and let you know that your valor and sacrifice is not forgotten.



Is it President's Day, Presidents' Day or Washington's Birthday?

Well, it depends...

Contrary to popular belief, the *Federal* holiday celebrated on the third Monday in February is NOT “Presidents’ Day”. It is in fact (and always has been) “Washington’s Birthday”. In 1878 Congress passed a law establishing February 22nd as a National Holiday honoring George Washington’s Birthday. In 1968, Congress passed the “Uniform Monday Holiday Act” that changed the observance of the day to the third Monday of February. During debate on the bill, some argued that the name be changed to “Presidents’ Day” to honor both Washington and Abraham Lincoln – whose birthday, on February 12th was celebrated by many states (including Pennsylvania) but not recognized as a national holiday. Here in Pennsylvania, Act 275 of 1978, eliminated Lincoln’s Birthday as a holiday, replacing it with the Martin Luther King Jr. Day on January 15th. The same legislation, changed the name of the third Monday in February from “Washington’s Birthday” to “Presidents’ Day” (The apostrophe indicates a plural possessive – meaning it celebrates more than one president). At least nine other states spell the holiday the same way. Some states designate the holiday as President’s Day (with the apostrophe indicating singular possessive) and still other states like New Jersey, Nevada and Oregon don’t use an apostrophe at all naming the day Presidents Day. Michigan and New York celebrate Washington’s Birthday. Ohio and several other states recognize Washington – Lincoln Day. So, the short answer is: It depends on where you live. Regardless of what it’s called, you can be sure there will be great sales on mattresses!



Did you know... George Washington got to celebrate his twenty-first birthday *twice*. Confused? Washington was born in Virginia (an English Colony) on February 11, 1731, (according to the Julian calendar in use at the time) In 1752, when Washington was twenty one, England adopted the Gregorian calendar which moved Washington’s birthday one year and 11 days forward to February 22, 1732 ... making him twenty again! (The Gregorian calendar was first proposed by Pope Gregory XIII in 1582 as a replacement for the Julian calendar which was introduced by Julius Caesar in 46 BC. The Gregorian calendar changed the spacing of leap years to more closely approximate the time it takes the earth to revolve around the sun.)

Persian Gulf War Veterans Day

On November 17, 2021, Governor Wolf signed into law Senate Bill 248 designating March 6 of each year as Persian Gulf War Veteran's Day and October 7th of each year as Global War on Terrorism Veterans Day. The designation requires the Governor to annually issue a proclamation encouraging all public schools and educational institutions to observe Persian Gulf War Veterans Day and to conduct exercises recognizing the contributions of all those involved in the Persian Gulf War/Global War on Terrorism and remembering the sacrifices they made for their country. The proclamation may not mandate a public school or educational institution to participate in the observance. The law also designates September 27th as First Responders Day.

Persian Gulf War Veterans Day.

The General Assembly finds and declares as follows:

- (1) On August 2, 1990, Saddam Hussein ordered Iraqi troops to invade and occupy the sovereign nation of Kuwait.
- (2) The United States led an international coalition demanding Saddam Hussein to withdraw Iraqi forces from Kuwait by January 15, 1991.
- (3) After Iraq failed to meet the deadline passed by the United Nations Security Council, President George H. W. Bush on January 16, 1991, ordered United States Armed Forces to begin Operation Desert Storm.
- (4) On January 17, 1991, 750,000 coalition forces from 36 nations, including 540,000 United States Armed Forces, began the battle to liberate Kuwait from occupation.
- (5) After an intensive air campaign, coalition forces liberated Kuwait City on February 28, 1991.
- (6) On March 6, 1991, after negotiating a cease-fire, President Bush announced the end of combat operations.
- (7) By the end of the conflict, 200 United States Armed Forces members were killed, including 29 from this Commonwealth.
- (8) The bravery of United States Armed Forces and their allies should be recognized for the liberation of Kuwait and restoration of Kuwait's sovereignty as an independent nation.

On the last Thursday of each month at 2PM, Washington's Crossing National Cemetery in Newtown, Bucks County holds a ceremony for all veterans who have died during the month but had no one attending their burial. The ceremony includes full Military Honors and a folded flag is presented to a volunteer on behalf of those who died. Everyone deserves to have someone at the end: to have their name spoken and their lives and service honored and memorialized. The cemetery is located at 830 Highland Rd., Newtown, PA. Please think about attending if you can.
